

Punctuation: The use of symbols to clarify meaning, indicate pauses, and create lists.

RULE	EXPLANATION	EXAMPLE(S)
Extra Commas	Extra commas between different parts of speech interrupt a subject or verb from its object, adjectives from nouns, or adverbs from verbs.	X Randy likes, cake.
Items in a Series	Use a comma to separate items in a list.	X I like cooking my family and my pets.
Misplaced Commas	Delete commas when you think there's a pause, but there isn't.	✓ Joe plays soccer, because he's fast.
Apostrophes ≠ Plurals	Do not add an apostrophe to make a word plural. Use an apostrophe for contractions and possession.	X She collects button's. She collects button's.
Introductory Elements	Use commas to separate introductory elements, which provide extra information.	When she was a little girl Josie played football.
Parenthetical Elements	Separate non-essential asides, thoughts, or appositives with commas.	Megan my best friend is a senior in high school.
Colons (:) and Semicolons (;)	Use colons to list items. Use semicolons to combine two complete sentences into one.	These are my favorite colleges BYU, OU, and OSU. The shoe is red, the sock is blue.
