Question	Correct Answer	Explanation
1	B	Sentence Structure: This is a comma splice, and one way to fix a comma splice is to make it two separate sentences using the correct punctuation.
2	E	Punctuation: The colon was used incorrectly. It should be a semi-colon, which connects two independent clauses into one sentence.
3	C	Punctuation: The colon was used incorrectly. Colons are used to list items or to introduce a quote.
4	G	Usage: The verb tense in is incorrect. It should be “want.”

Question	Correct Answer	Explanation
5	B	Sentence Structure: A dependent phrase that begins with “because” must connect to an independent clause for it to be a full sentence.
6	F	Sentence Structure: This is a comma splice. It should be separated into two complete sentences using the correct punctuation.
7	C	Sentence Structure: This is a run-on. Separate the sentences into two using the correct punctuation.

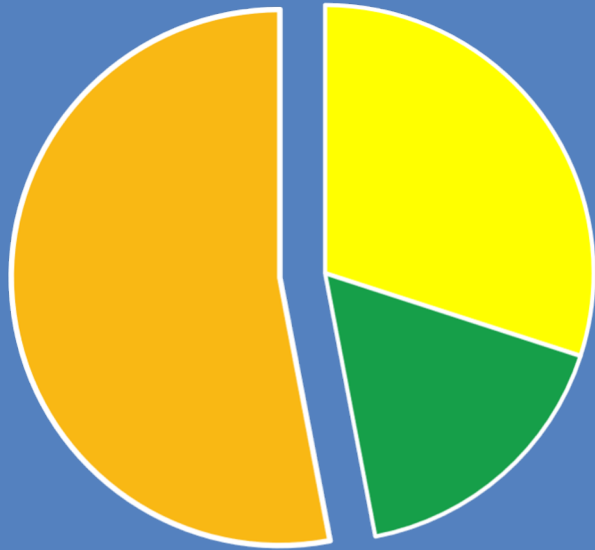

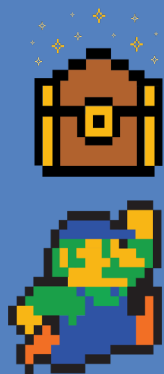




ACT English Subject Tip

Answer Choices

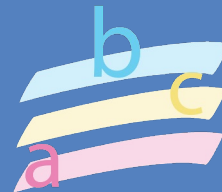
- Use the answer choices to figure out what the question is asking for.
 - For example, if all the answer choices have a common grammar pattern (i.e. they all have commas in different places) try to remember all that you learned about that specific grammar rule.





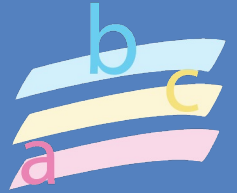

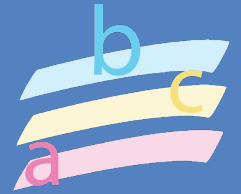
Category: Usage

Question	Explanation
1	This question is testing when to use contractions.
3	This question is asking about proper use of subject-verb agreement.
4	This question is concerning subject-verb agreement.
7	This question asks readers to choose an appropriate replacement for the word “consumers” without changing the meaning of the sentence.



Category: Punctuation

Question	Explanation
2	This question is testing your knowledge of whether a comma is extra or used correctly.
5	This question is concerning introductory phrases and commas.



Category: Sentence Structure

Question	Explanation
6	This question asks about verb tense shifts.

College ACT Requirements



24

- OU: ACT not required for admission. 24 ACT + 3.25 GPA - \$2,000 scholarship/year.
- OSU: 24 ACT + 3.0 GPA qualifies for \$1,000 scholarship/year.
- UCO: 24 ACT + 3.3 GPA for \$1,000 scholarship/year.

23

- Gives students a 50% chance of earning a B or higher and a 75% chance of earning a C or higher in science college courses.

21

- OSU: 21 ACT + 3.0 GPA required for admission.

20

- UCO: 20 ACT or 2.7 GPA and rank in the upper 50% of class for admission.

19

- Avoid remedial courses.
- OCCC: 19 ACT or 3.5 GPA qualifies for \$500 scholarship/year.
- University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff (HBCU): Discount of 90% on out-of-state tuition costs.

English Score Chart

English Score	Answers Correct	Percentage Correct
16	32-33	≈ 43%
17	34-35	≈ 46%
18	36-37	≈ 49%
19	38-39	≈ 51%
20	40-42	≈ 55%
21	43-45	≈ 59%
22	46-48	≈ 63%
23	49-51	≈ 67%
24	52-54	≈ 71%

“ If I want to avoid remedial classes I just need to get about 51% correct!

“ I have a chance at receiving scholarships when I get close to 71% correct!
