ARMS for Writing

- A = ADD. Add any words, phrases, or sentences that are needed to make the meaning clear.
- R = REMOVE. Delete any words, phrases, or sentences that are needed to make the paragraph concise.
- M = MOVE. Move any words, phrases, or sentences to make the meaning clear.
- **S** = **SUBSTITUTE**. Revise vague, clumsy, confusing, and wordy material. Use the word or phrase that is the most appropriate.





Test Tip - Revising for Clarity and Conciseness



 Most of the ACT questions focus on "choose the best answer," so make sure to choose the most concise sentence that DOES NOT change the meaning of the sentence.

Question	Correct Answer	Explanation
1	A	NO CHANGE is correct because the introductory material should be set apart from the main sentence using a comma.
2	G	"The plow horse" is an appositive or another name for "old George." If the appositive is extra information, then it should be set apart using commas.
3	В	Two independent clauses that are connected in a sentence using a conjunction "and" must have a comma before the conjunction.
4	Н	The sentences should be combined using an adverbial phrase "because" since they both talk about the same subject.

Question	Correct Answer	Explanation
5	С	This question concerns verb tense. The sentence primarily uses past tense verbs, so the verb "talk" should also be past tense.
6	J	When the sentence begins with an adverbial phrase, it should be separated from the main sentence with a comma.
7	D	This sentence was wordy, so the best choice was the sentence that was clear and concise and did not change the meaning of the original sentence.
8	н	The original sentence was a fragment because it lacked a subject.

Question	Correct Answer	Explanation
9	A	This choice is about plurals. To make a word a plural, add -s. No apostrophe or semicolon needed.
10	Н	This sentence is about verb tense. "Drive" is present tense, which is wrong since the narrator is remembering back to the what her dad would do.
11	D	The original sentence uses the wrong verb tense. It should be "made their way," not "making their way."
12	G	This question asks about what correct reflexive pronoun to use. Since "the dogs" is plural, "them" is correct.

Question	Correct Answer	Explanation
13	D	This sentence is concerned with verb tense. The verb should be "increased," which is past tense and no comma is needed.
14	G	This sentence includes a misplaced modifier and should be moved next to the item it modifies, which is after "retrieved the horns."
15	D	This paragraph should be removed because it doesn't add to the main idea of the essay.
