# **DECISION TIME (SAMPLE RESPONSES)**

### Patriot, Loyalist, or Neutral? You decide!

#### **Colonist A**

Colonist A is a poor farmer in the Hudson Valley of New York. He has paid little attention to the trouble brewing in the colonies, as his primary concern is his daily struggle to maintain his farm and support his family. Recently, his problems have worsened; his landowner, a Loyalist, has had financial troubles and raised Colonist A's rent three times in the last five months to offset his debts. Colonist A barely earns enough from selling his crops to pay the original rent, and with the increase, he now faces eviction. He and his wife, with their six children, fear they will have nowhere to go if forced to leave their farm.

This colonist deals with the day-to-day struggles of farming and is unaware of the issues of rebellion, so he might be Neutral. However, if the high rent imposed by his Loyalist landowner drives him to frustration, he may start sympathizing with the Patriots as a means to challenge his landlord's authority.

#### **Colonist B**

Colonist B is a wealthy woman from New York City. Her husband's business brings substantial wealth and honor to the family. She often claims to be related to several members of the British House of Lords. She worries about the violence from mobs known as the Sons of Liberty and fears that her family's wealth and connections to Britain may make them targets.

Colonist B is likely a Loyalist due to her family's wealth and connections to the British House of Lords. She perceives the Patriots as unruly "mobs" and fears for her family's safety, aligning her loyalty with Britain for security.

means breaking the law. Since the Townshend Acts placed a tax on tea, Colonist C has been
illegally importing tea from the Dutch. His ships frequently hide from the British navy and

However, as they moved towards the Ohio Valley, British soldiers informed him that the Proclamation of 1763 prohibits this migration.

Answers may vary. Colonist E may be Neutral, as he lives on the frontier where talk of rebellion might be less common. However, the British restriction on his settlement in the Ohio Valley could push him toward the Patriots if he feels restricted by British policies.

#### **Colonist F**

Colonist F is a merchant in New York City whose business imports products from Europe, especially Britain. He is secretly concerned about recent talks of independence, fearing that an independent America couldn't protect his ships at sea, unlike the British navy, which currently escorts colonial ships across the Atlantic to protect them from pirates. Since the Townshend Acts, the Sons of Liberty have pressured store owners to remove British goods from their shelves. After his friend was attacked by a mob for selling British products, Colonist F joined the boycotts.

Answers may vary. Colonist F might be a Loyalist or Neutral. He relies on British naval protection for his business and fears the Patriots' influence. Although he complies with Patriot-led boycotts, he does so more out of fear than true support for independence.

## **Colonist H**

Colonist H owns a tobacco plantation and practices law in the Virginia colony. Often, wages are paid in tobacco, typically two pennies per pound. Due to Virginia's harsh winters, tobacco crops are scarce. The British government has raised the price of tobacco per pound against the wishes of the Virginia House of Burgesses, leading some ministers in the colony to demand wages at the higher price. Colonist H opposes this and has made a speech in the House of Burgesses protesting the unfair price imposed by the king.
