Reciprocal and Quotient Identities

- $\frac{1}{\sin\theta} = \csc\theta$
- $\frac{1}{\cos\theta} = \sec\theta$
- $\frac{1}{\tan\theta} = \cot\theta$
- $\frac{1}{\csc\theta} = \sin\theta$ • $\frac{1}{\sec\theta} = \cos\theta$

• $\frac{1}{\cot\theta} = \tan\theta$

- $\frac{\sin\theta}{\cos\theta} = \tan\theta$
- $\frac{\cos\theta}{\sin\theta} = \cot\theta$

Pythagorean Identities

- $\sin^2 \theta + \cos^2 \theta = 1$
- $\tan^2 \theta + 1 = \sec^2 \theta$
- $1 + \cot^2 \theta = \csc^2 \theta$

Verifying Trigonometric Identities

Verifying an identity is proving that one side actually equals the other side. This is done by algebraically manipulating one side of the equation, often using identities, until it equals the other side. *Hint: Start with the scariest-looking side.*
