Here we have to add something new! <p>Argumentative writing has something expository writing doesn't: _____</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Address the OTHER point of view in an argument You MUST have one to have a valid argument 	<p>Acknowledge the counterclaim _____, then _____ it by explaining why your point of view is better.</p> <p>REFUTE= _____</p> <p>_____</p> <p>Example: <u>Claim</u>: Since smoking can cause cancer, people should not smoke.</p> <p><u>Counterclaim</u>: Some may say that just because something has the potential to cause cancer doesn't mean that it will, so it isn't necessary to avoid smoking altogether.</p> <p><u>Refutation</u>: However, when your health is on the line, it's better to weigh the risks and avoid an activity that has been proven to be so dangerous.</p> <p>Including the counterclaim, an outline of an argumentative paragraph looks like this:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Claim ● Lead-in/ Evidence ● Commentary ● Lead-in/ Evidence ● Commentary ● Counterclaim ● Refutation ● Conclusion
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
