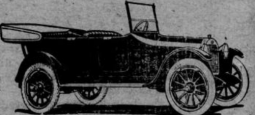

"OVERTHROW WORLD ORDER!" CRY COMMUNISTS

Manifesto of Communist International, Seized in U. S. De-
partment of Justice Raids. Tells "Reds" Own
Story of Their Plans for World Wide Plunder.

Extracts from "Manifesto of the Communist International"—Adopt-
ed by the Congress of the Communist International at Moscow, March
24, 1919, and signed by Comrades C. Rakovsky, N. Lenin, M. Zinov-
jev, L. Trotsky and Fritz Platten.

Altogether, the declining dynasty of the Bonapartes, Hohenzollerns and
Hapsburgs, and the capitalist oligarchy of these lands, the rulers of France,
England, Italy and the United States stand revealed in the light of anti-
events and diplomatic disclosures, in their immeasurable villainies.

Representing the half-breeds, hypocrisy and corruption of the decadent
official socialist parties we, the Communists assembled in the Third Inter-
national, feel ourselves to be the direct successors of the heroic efforts and
sacrifices of a long series of revolutionary generations from Babeuf to Karl
Lindbergh and Rosa Luxemburg. As the First International foretold the
future development and pointed the way as the Second International guided
together and organized millions of the proletarians, so the Third Inter-
national is the international of open avowed revolutionaries, the international
of the international of the proletariat. Socialist criticism has sufficiently stipulated
the bourgeois world order. The task of the International Communist Party is
now to overthrow this order and to erect in its place the structure of the
socialist world order. We urge the working men and women of all countries
to unite under the Communist banner, the emblem under which the first great
victories have already been won.

Proletarians of all lands! In the war against imperialistic barbarity,
against war, against the privileged classes, against the bourgeois state
and bourgeois property, against all forms and varieties of social and national
oppression—UNITED!

Under the standard of the Workers' Councils, under the banner of
the Third International, in the revolutionary struggle for power and the in-
tegrity of the proletarian, proletarians of all countries! UNITED!

The revolutionaries are, compute the proletarians to make use of the means
of battle which will overcome the entire bourgeois, namely, mass action, with
the logical resultant, direct conflict with the governmental machinery in open
combat. All other methods, such as revolutionary use of bourgeois parliamen-
tarianism, will be of only secondary significance.

The indispensable condition for successful struggle is separation not only
from the direct services of capitalism and socialism of the capitalist revolu-
tion, in which role the Social Democracy of the Right appear, but also from
the Party of the Center (Socialism), who desert the proletarians in the
critical moment in order to come to terms with its open antagonists.

The growth of the revolutionary movement in all lands, the danger of
suppression of this revolution through the coalition of capitalist states, the
strength of the Social Revolution to make with one gesture the formation
of the Yellow "Internationale," at Bern, and to give their services to the Wil-
sonian League; finally, the obvious necessity for the revolution of proletarians
sections—all these demand the formation of a real revolutionary and real
proletarian Communist International. This International, which understands
the essential national interests to the interests of the international revolution,
will presently the mutual help of the proletarians of the different countries,
for without economic and other mutual help the proletarians will not be
able to organize the new society.

Proletarians are the saviors of the working class. Their best-Lep-
kowski, Rosa Luxemburg—they have been. Against this the proletarians must
defend itself, defend its own rights. The Communist International calls the
entire world proletariat to this final struggle.
