The snake is "milked" for venom.	Venom is injected into a horse whose immune system starts making antibodies.
Some blood is withdrawn from the horse.	After getting additional booster shots of venom over a year, the horse produces many antibodies.
Snakebite patients get vials of antivenom through an IV.	Blood is spun in a lab and separated into plasma and blood cells. The plasma, containing antibodies, is kept.
Plasma is sent to a lab, purified, and packaged into individual vials.
