

Personal Narrative with Pronoun-Antecedent Analysis

Assignment Overview

Write a short narrative (1-2 pages) that addresses the prompt and demonstrates your understanding of pronoun-antecedent relationships. Choose ONE of the following prompts:

<p><i>The Impossible Choice</i></p> <p><i>You're a soldier on the march. Your friend is falling behind, but if you stop to help, you might both die. Another soldier offers to help carry him but warns you it could put all three of you at risk. Write about the decision you face and what you choose to do.</i></p>	<p><i>What I Saw Someone Else Do</i></p> <p><i>Write about witnessing another soldier make a choice during the march—helping someone, sharing food, protecting someone weaker, or abandoning a friend. You weren't directly involved, but you saw what happened between them.</i></p>
<p><i>The Story We Tell Differently</i></p> <p><i>Two survivors from the same unit remember the same incident completely differently—one thinks someone showed courage, the other thinks they abandoned their comrades. Write both versions of what happened.</i></p>	<p><i>The Friend Who Got Me Through</i></p> <p><i>Write about someone who helped you survive and someone whom you helped in return. How did you depend on each other when everything was falling apart?</i></p>

Important Requirements

- **Choose your perspective:** Write in either **first person** (I, me, we) OR **third person** (he, she, they, the student). You must remain consistent throughout your entire narrative.
- **Highlight your work:** Use **yellow** to highlight all pronouns and **blue** to highlight their antecedents (or choose two colors that work for you).
- **Length:** 1-2 pages, double-spaced

Pronoun-Antecedent Identification & Highlighting	All pronouns and antecedents are accurately highlighted in yellow (or chosen color) or in blue (or chosen color). Student demonstrates clear understanding by correctly identifying 95-100% of pronoun-antecedent pairs. No missing highlights. Work is thorough and complete.	Most pronouns and antecedents are accurately highlighted. Student correctly identifies 80-94% of pronoun-antecedent pairs. Minor omissions (1-3 missing highlights)	Some pronouns and antecedents are highlighted, but several are missing. Student correctly identifies 65-79% of pronoun-antecedent pairs. Multiple omissions or some incorrect identifications.	Few pronouns or antecedents are highlighted. Students correctly identify fewer than 65% of pronoun-antecedent pairs.
