<p style="text-align: center;">GERUNDS</p> <p>To find gerunds in sentences, just look for a verb + ing that is used as a noun.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;">ANA WAS <u>FLYING</u> IN THE PLANE</p> <p style="text-align: center;">DAVEY STARTED <u>TELLING</u> THE FACTS</p> <p style="text-align: center;"><u>EATING</u> ICE CREAM CAN CAUSE BRAIN FREEZE</p>
<p style="text-align: center;">COMPOUND SENTENCES</p> <p>Joins two or more sentences that have related ideas usually with a conjunction. The two sentences go together.</p>	<p>I WANT TO BUY A CAR, BUT I’LL RIDE THE BUS.</p> <p>HE CAN GO, FOR HE’S DONE WITH WORK.</p> <p>AMOS BAKED COOKIES; ADAM ATE THEM.</p>
<p style="text-align: center;">COMPOUND-COMPLEX SENTENCES</p> <p>Made up of more than one sentence joined by a conjunction, and at least one of those sentences is compound. It is a compound sentence with a dependent, or subordinate clause.</p>	<p>ALTHOUGH SHE LIKES BASKETBALL, SHAY WENT TO THE SOCCER GAME AND SHE ENJOYED IT.</p> <p>I FOLDED THE LAUNDRY, BUT I DIDN’T MAKE DINNER OR CLEAN THE HOUSE.</p>
<p style="text-align: center;">PREDICATES</p> <p>The part of a sentence or clause containing a verb and stating something about the subject. It’s what the subject does.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;">“WENT HOME” IN “JOHN <u>WENT HOME</u>”</p>
